6.3	Do you have a question on your intake form that asks everyone if they have an intervention order for them and/or their children?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	
6.4	If women and children (and others) have intervention orders, do you have a clear process to follow and ways to contact police and/or Family Violence support?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	Have you included local Family Violence experts and FV Police Liaisons in your Emergency Management Planning Committees?
6.5	Have you considered designating specific rooms or spaces as 'safe areas' for those with intervention orders and providing toys for children in these areas?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	Note that women and others may not feel safe in shared spaces.
6.6	Have you allocated safe, private, and separate spaces for women, men and people of diverse gender and sexual identities, to contact services such as family violence services, etc.? (1800 RESPECT, Men's referral line, Qlife)			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	Please note that women and people of diverse gender and sexual identities may be reluctant to engage with faith-based support, police, and emergency services due to history or perception of discrimination.
6.7	Have you allocated safe and separate places and toilets for women and people of diverse gender and sexual identities?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	Good practice ensures lockable toilets for women, men, and people of diverse gender and sexual identities at a minimum. <sup>1</sup>
6.8	Have you ensured several toilets have 'All genders' signs (in addition to Female and Male toilets)?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	*Signs and further information available <u>here</u>
6.9	Have you considered placement of baby change tables/rooms and nappy waste bins, to allow family, friends, or caregivers of all genders to change babies' nappies in a safe environment?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	
6.10	Are there other ways to increase safety for women, men and people of diverse gender and sexual identities in the evacuation and relief centre?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	As experts in your community, you are best placed to design appropriate and effective local approaches.  Other guidelines may be relevant for people of all ages, abilities,

7.1	Is there a way to provide access for sexual and reproductive health prescriptions/ medications if people have left them at home (contraceptives, PrEP, HIV, hormones, etc.)?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	For example, through telehealth, an identified local GP and pharmacist, etc.
7.2	On your intake form do you enquire if individuals need to store medication? And can you safely refrigerate them?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	For example, refrigeration of hormones, locked cabinets, etc.
7.3	Are sanitary items (pads, tampons) included as normal items in the First Aid kit and available at the evacuation/relief centre?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	
7.4	Are processes in place to appropriately dispose of sanitary items? Consider the placement of disposal facilities in all toilets.			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>

8.1	Have you included information or website links about family violence services, referral services, etc. to everyone accessing the evacuation or relief centre?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	Best practice suggests a universal approach where such information and posters are readily seen by everyone, e.g., on walls, on intake table, etc.
8.2	Have you included the Rainbow Flag, Rainbow lanyards, posters, brochure with same-sex couples etc. to indicate inclusion and welcome for people of diverse gender and sexual identities?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	
8.3	Are processes in place to respond to gender-based complaints of harassment by staff, volunteers, or other attendees/ evacuees? Is this process advised during intake procedure?			<ul><li>Planning</li><li>Response</li></ul>	You can see an example here.  Best practice is that confidentiality is prioritised, although this may be difficult in evacuation conditions.
