Prevention and preparedness: Australia's emergency management arrangements

Speed read

- Prevention measures try to eliminate the impact of hazards and reduce vulnerability to them.
- Mitigation measures accept that hazards will happen and work to lessen their impact through physical solutions and by strengthening community resilience.
- Preparedness involves actions to make sure that as risks increase or during an emergency, resources and services are ready, and communities can respond and recover.

Key points

- State and territory governments have the primary role in prevention and mitigation. This role is often supported by legislation and policy.
- Prevention, mitigation and preparedness activities and strategies are undertaken by governments, non-government organisations, agencies, businesses, communities and individuals.
- Prevention, mitigation and preparedness activities and priorities should be informed by risk assessment and regularly reviewed.
- Risks change and evolve over time. Planning, exercising and lessons management are key to improving
 preparedness and the development of capability.

Examples of prevention and mitigation strategies that lead to greater resilience include:

- o hazard-specific control programs, such as building flood levees or bushfire mitigation programs
- o land use planning and building controls in legislation and regulations
- o community education and awareness, for example flood and cyclone safety messaging

Examples of preparedness activities include:

- developing household emergency plans and preparing emergency kits to last 72 hours
- o developing tailored response and recovery plans
- o critical infrastructure resilience planning and cooperation, across all levels of government and in partnership with the business sector
