

Introduction to safe and healthy crowded places

Speed read

- A crowded place is a number of people who intentionally, predictably or spontaneously find themselves gathered in a physical space.
- Clear communication is a critical requirement in managing crowded places.
- Under the *Workplace Health and Safety Act* places responsibility for a crowded place is on the management team.

Key points

There are nine key principles and enablers for safe and healthy crowded places. Consult relevant legislation, regulations, laws and standards which may provide enforceable requirements regarding crowded places.

There are three different crowd types:

1. Planned events, such as sporting and music events, festivals and displays.
2. Predicted crowds, places likely to be crowded some or all the time such as airports, shopping centres, CBDs, beaches, schools, universities and transport hubs.
3. Spontaneous crowds, such as gatherings at an incident, spontaneous protests or rallies.

Events management sector and crowded place controls and plans need to be dynamic. The increasing density and diversity of populations living in urban and regional areas, the proliferation of risk-taking recreational activities, and advances in technology all have an impact on a crowded place.

Responsibility for safe and healthy crowded places is for professionals responsible for organising events, managing venues, enacting health and safety protocols. Including: local governments, businesses (corporates, professional event management companies), small and large community groups, not-for-profit and non-government organisations and emergency services.
