# Principles and enablers for safe and healthy crowded places

### Speed read

- Nine nationally agreed principles guide planning and managing crowded places.
- Seven enabling themes can be considered alongside each principle.
- The principles and enablers were workshopped and agreed on by the AIDR Safe and healthy crowded places handbook working group.

## **Key points**

#### Principle 1: Community at the centre

Community cohesion, engagement and accessibility are important and can be facilitated by safe and healthy crowded places.

### Principle 4: Engage early, develop partnerships and relationships

Emphasise collaborative, multiagency approaches to planning and decision making across broad stakeholder groups.

#### Principle 7: Ensure situational awareness

Be mindful of emerging risks and issues locally and nationally, including having awareness within the crowded place and outside in the community.

#### Principle 2: Consider all possibilities

Recognise and identify other types of hazards and other threats and think through likely risks as the starting point for all subsequent planning.

#### Principle 5: Communicate clearly using accessible language

The handbook intends to to provide user-friendly and accessible guidance, including those who may not be familiar with planning and emergency and risk management language.

#### Principle 8: Encourage safe behaviour and self-care

Emphasise prevention, education and harm minimisation approaches, and encourage attendees of crowded places to take personal responsibility for their own wellbeing.

#### Principle 3: Plan early and proportionately to need and risk

Recognise the impact of the size, scope, scale and context of the crowded place. Take a needsbased approach, informed by identification of risks and consequences.

#### Principle 6: Ensure role clarity and shared responsibility

Shared responsibility does not represent an abrogation of responsibility; rather it acknowledges that everyone has accountability for ensuring crowded places are safe and healthy.

#### Principle 9: Continually learn and improve

Apply lessons learned in the moment and from previous experiences across many crowded places. Use flexible, agile and adaptive approaches.
